Growing up in Lublin, Poland, Anna Ballas was interested in complexity of patterns and designs. She enjoyed working with clothing and textiles, but it was ultimately her fascination with patterns of the brain that shaped her career choice. Anna, who is Program Manager at Felton Institute's PREP (Prevention and Recovery in Early Psychosis) Monterey County site and a CBTP (Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Psychosis) trainer, earned her Master's in Clinical Psychology in Poland.

"I was always interested in the motivations behind why people do what they do and why they think what they think," she reflects. While working a summer job in Greece, she met her

They are much more engaged in their lives, activities and deep meaningful relationships."

"Anna has strong clinical skills and is very passionate about changing the lives of young people experiencing early signs of psychosis," notes PREP Division Director Adriana Furuzawa.

PREP was established with a commitment to seamlessly integrate a number of evidence-based practices that have demonstrated their effectiveness in addressing the needs of individuals experiencing early psychosis. The National Council for Behavioral Health honored Felton's PREP with Inspiring Hope Awards in 2015 and 2014, in the Peer Specialist and Science-to-Science categories.

For Anna, "engaging with young people to help them learn to manage psychotic illness is somewhat similar to the way that people learn to manage chronic physical diseases-with awareness of symptoms and early warning signs-as well as importance of sustaining healthy, balanced lifestyle" is enormously satisfying. When Anna is not working, she enjoys dancing, with the Tango and Salsa among her favorites. She sees yoga as the perfect complement to her connect with other people with lived experience and support and acknowledge the need for our voices to be heard at this conference," Dina reflected.

"Being in such a minority, it can feel a bit overwhelming, and it was really wonderful to be able to support each other in sharing the value of peer support. The most rewarding thing was hearing how thankful people were to learn from what we went through in navigating the mental health system ourselves and then what peer support could look like in working with people experiencing psychosis. After winning the Peer Specialist of the Year Award at the National Council of Behavioral Health Conference last year, I was thrilled to be able to present information about my work at Felton's PREP Alameda in a more in-depth manner. People truly respond when we share our lived experience, and this conference is moving in the right direction by including the voices of people who have received mental health services."

Every year, executives, board members, thought leaders, and behavioral health professionals from the nation's health, mental health, and addiction care organizations come together for the spring conference. The website thenationalcouncil.org reports that National Council President and CEO Linda Rosenberg kicked off NatCon16 with a comparison of where the industry was ten years ago and where it is today. She spoke about policy, technology, and the social determinants of health to the 5,600 attendees.

"Because of our struggles and our progress, we have an unprecedented opportunity to help people at the margins, and you have developed the tools to do that," she told attendees.

Rosenberg also highlighted NatCon's growth from 700 organization members to 2,700 in the past decade.

What began as a hiking exercise at Twin Peaks over a decade ago has evolved into providing an opportunity for crime victims to experience the best of human kindness at a time when they need it the most. [Photo from NBC Bay Area] 2730 Bryant Street in San Francisco. While the official launch is scheduled for May 2nd, the intake process and wide spread interest have already begun.

FEAP is a high-quality early intervention program for children with autism based on the Early Start Denver Model (ESDM), the only program that has been validated in a randomized clinical trial for use with children with autism as young as eighteen months of age. This rigorously evaluated program has been found to be effective for children with autism across a wide range of learning styles and abilities.

FEAP is the first inclusive center-based program in San Francisco that has a curriculum designed specifically for children with autism. Felton's Family Developmental Center (FDC) is San Francisco's licensed and largest subsidized early care and education program serving children birth to six years old. For over forty-five years, it has been the only program in San Francisco to serve infants and toddlers who have physical or developmental challenges, within an inclusive program model. Felton Fact

While we often refer to the founder of Felton Institute as Katharine or Kitty Felton, actually Dr. Felton is a much more fitting title.

Dr. Katharine Felton, the visionary behind the Family Service Agency of San Francisco which now honors her with the name Felton Institute, received not one, but two, honoris causa "Doctor of Laws" degrees, conferred upon her by what is today known as University of California at Berkeley, her alma mater as an undergraduate in 1895, and by Mills College in Oakland, CA. The two degrees "for the sake of the honor" waived usual requirements such as matriculation, residence, study, and the passing of examinations.

Honorary degrees, although not earned by standard methods, highlight the fact the individual earned the distinction through lessons learned and applied in the "school of life."

Dr. Felton was certainly a forerunner in the betterment of social conditions. Her

There are seniors within the Bay Area living under sub-par conditions and experiencing abuse or neglect.

Felton's Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program is designed to help seniors in need and eliminate any factors compromising the welfare, health, safety, and rights of residents either within their own home, an assisted-living facility, a nursing home, or hospital.

Staff and field Ombudsmen are trained professionals who are certified by the State of California to carry out the duties according to the Ombudsman laws. In addition to investigating complaints of neglect or abuse, Volunteer Ombudsmen regularly visit long-term care facilities to provide supportive, friendly contact with residents, improving their daily living experience.

The Ombudsman program also assists seniors as they come to grips with the difficult transitions associated with declining health and increasing needs dedication to the alleviation of suffering, especially among children, improved the well being of society in general. As a result, in her obituary in the San Francisco Examiner, the columnist quoted Dr. Robert Sproul, the President of UC Berkeley in 1940, who described Katharine Felton as "the warm-hearted guardian of the poor, protector of childhood, an inspiring crusader whose work has been characterized by wisdom as well as benevolence." for support in navigating life's changes.
