His maternal grandmother often praised his good grades and let him know that she was very proud of him.

When he was 17, Kenji and his parents moved to San Leandro, California. After high school, he matriculated at Cal State Hayward,

Felton Fact: Evolution of A Name

In 1889, a group of progressive non-profit organizations came together in San Francisco and founded the Associated Charities of San Francisco.

In 1901, the fledgling organization made the decision to appoint Katharine Felton as the first director of the new Associated Charities of San Francisco, a remarkable accomplishment for a woman at a time when women were still lobbying for the right to vote in the United States.

In 1932, in the aftermath of the stock market crash of 1929 and ensuing Great Depression, the Associated Charities of San Francisco changed its name to the Citizen's Agency for Social Welfare to reflect its increasing role as a social welfare agency and to avoid the stigma associated with the word "charity."



Deaf Community Counseling Services

Formerly known as UCSF Center on Deafness, Felton's <u>Deaf Community</u> <u>Counseling Services</u> (DCCS) provides quality, innovative mental health services for adults and children who are Deaf, Hard-of-Hearing, Late Deafened, Deaf-Blind and their families and partners in San Francisco and Alameda Counties.

DCCS staff works with adults, seniors and children beginning at five years of age. Younger children are seen by referral. We address a number of mental health issues including depression, anxiety, mood or thought disorders, adjustment reactions, stress, relationship issues, family problems and other mental health issues. All staff members are fluent in American Sign Language (ASL) and most of our DCCS team has lived experience with being Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing.

Our licensed therapists (MFTs, LCSWs and LPCCs) and registered interns are trained and experienced in mental health services for the Deaf, Hard-of-Hearing, Late Deafened, Deaf-Blind, as well as their families and partners.

DCCS has served the community for

In 1934, the Board of the Citizen's Agency for Social Welfare reorganized and changed the name to the Children's Agency to more appropriately reflect its mission. One year before that, as a result of the Great Depression, the federal government required that all federal and state funds be expended only by public agencies. In compliance, San Francisco created a County Welfare Department.

In 1938, the County Welfare
Department took over all family
services previously handled by
private agencies. At that time, the
Family Service Agency was
established as a separate
organization with a focus on
diagnosing and treating shortterm family problems. The first 18
months were funded by a
generous grant from the
Rosenberg Foundation, and, due
to its success, the agency was
subsequently funded by the
community chest.

In 1945, the Children's Agency and the Family Service Agency merged to become the Family and Children's Agency, with a new administrative program for finding foster homes, establishing more intimate cooperation with the juvenile court, and integration of children's work with family service work.

In 1949, children's services, foster care, and relief became part of the Department of Public Welfare, and a year later, the over 45 years and has been part of Felton Institute since July 2012.

In March of 1958, the organization's name changed to the Family Service Agency of San Francisco.

After 56 years, in 2014, due to expanded services and to honor its visionary founding director, our agency became known as Felton Institute.




