Jordan Pont, MFT, is a California native who serves as Program Director for Felton's Adult Program and Full Service Partnership for Transitional Age Youth (TAY). TAY programs help provide stability, goal achievement and self-sufficiency to youth, ages 16–25, who are dealing with the challenges of serious and persistent mental illness, substance abuse and homelessness.

Growing up in Modesto with two sisters, Jordan always knew that her vocation would be in the helping profession.

"My dad, who is an OB/GYN, and my mom, who is a nurse, are from the East Coast. Somehow they chose a little Central Valley town that has provided respite from cold weather and warm, loving friends who have become like family. My sisters and I followed

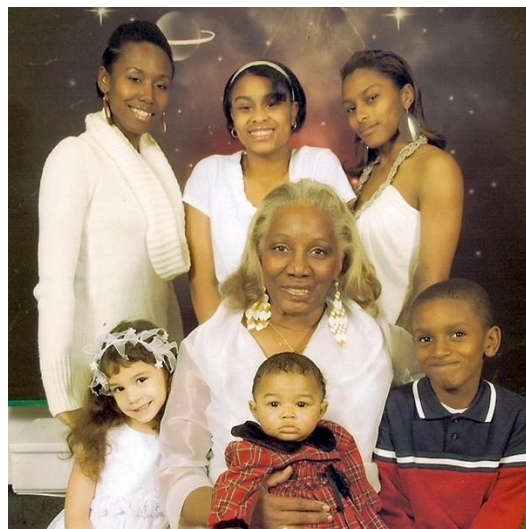

our parents example and we all work in healthcare. My family has instilled in me the values of hard work, punctuality, kindness, respect, and a 'you can do it' attitude."

As a college student in the Bay Area, Jordan discovered her life's calling. "I went to undergrad at UC Berkeley--Go Bears!--and majored in Psychology. I completed my Master's in Counseling Psychology with an emphasis in Marriage and Family Therapy at University of San Francisco. I discovered my love for counseling after taking a Human Sexuality course at Cal taught by a couples counselor. When he lectured on humans' responses to conflict, I was hooked!

"I've always liked learning about people; their story, their family life, their struggles, and their strengths. I'm also pretty sensitive and am a critical thinker, so talking, problem solving, and helping as a profession just clicked with me!"

Jordan lived in Hermosa Beach briefly, but she was homesick and returned to the Bay Area where both of her sisters and her brother-in-law also live. Before coming aboard in 2009, she worked at a school for severely emotionally disturbed children. Jordan's journey to the Felton family began through mutual friends at a bar.

"I knew I wanted to provide therapy to a very deserving population, but I was new to case management. The first few weeks outreaching were interesting, to say the least! I luckily had amazing co-workers to guide and support me." She finds her work intense and simultaneously very rewarding.

"Sometimes a colleague or client says something positive or makes a change that reinforces that we do amazing work. We're right there with the clients, at their homes, at the doctor's office, sitting with them while they get their teeth cleaned, outreaching to them on the streets, and meeting their families and friends. We become a part of their lives, and inevitably, they become a part of ours. It feels good to know that the work we are doing has great impact in our community and beyond."

Jordan adds, "I have watched clients and colleagues get married, and welcome children into their lives, and it's been beautiful getting to be a part of that."

When she's not working, Jordan savors yoga, hiking, quiet walks and time with family and friends. She loves plants and jokes that her apartment and her office are mini-greenhouses.

Since Mr. Hofman joined JML in 1992 (started in 1990 by his wife Janet Moyer), he has helped transform the company from a sole proprietorship into a successful corporation, with increasing revenues and profitability. Felton Fact From The Beginning

During the early 1900's, in Katharine "Kitty" Felton's day, it was not uncommon for unscrupulous people to walk the streets of San Francisco asking for donations allegedly to help the many homeless children which populated the alleys and dark corners of the city, only to disappear with the change they received, leaving the children to fend for themselves.

Many adults were victims of kidnapping. San Francisco was a hub for human prospectors looking to nab an unsuspecting victim to serve as unwilling crew members for clipper ships of the day heading for China. Then once on foreign land, the victims were sold into slavery.

A stranger walking through the doors of a pub might become the victim of "crimpers" (people who harvest sailors by abducting them and subjecting them to forced labor). If the stranger ordered a drink in just the right spot in front of the bar, a

trap floor-door could quickly be triggered and closed and the perpetrators scored another pay day.

The word "wild" in the phrase "Wild West" was no misnomer and corporations were on guard.

But once Kitty Felton's reputation of confirmed integrity spread throughout the city of San Francisco, these same companies agreed to help fund projects organized by the agency that Dr. Felton directed.


At the time, the fledgling American Red Cross was reluctant to release any funds to any department of the city of San Francisco, or to any business or individual. But again, they were willing to turn over funds directly to Katharine Felton and the Associated Charities of San Francisco, because of her spotless and unwavering moral and ethical character.

From the beginning, thanks to the authentic and sincere intentions of Dr. Katharine Felton and the virtue that made up her life's work, Felton Institute has vigilantly perpetuated the commitment to excellence, integrity and the empowering of those in need.

It's often said that great colleagues are kindred spirits, but in the case of Connie Ye and Alicia Amatonding, they are actually kin, sisters who both serve as Foster Grandparents at Felton's Family Developmental Center.

Connie and Alicia grew up in the Phillipines, but the Bay Area has been home for many years. After retirement, Connie grew bored at home and told her husband that she was going to look for a meaningful volunteer experience. When she was accepted in the Foster Grandparent Program, "I was so excited," Connie recalls. "I told my sister, they're going to hire us! You have to come with me." And, as a dutiful younger sister, Alicia did as told.

"It makes me feel happy! It makes me feel young, taking care of children," Alicia smiles.

Now in its 51st year, Felton's Foster Grandparent Program was one of 20 original national pilot projects. Limited-income, mobile seniors, ages 55 and older, receive small stipends for providing support services for 20 hours a week to children with special needs. They develop one-to-one

consistent relationships with the children by tutoring, mentoring and providing emotional support.
